I have always felt that the beginning of a new congregational year can be somewhat confusing. Solemn, yet celebratory. Stirring, yet scary. Inspiring, but rather intimidating.

But there are facets of this special season that are as clear as the clarion call of the

shofar itself. You see, during this opening month of the liturgical year, we not only have our Water Communion (please bring water from locations you visited over the summer), Ingatherings and Welcome back meals, but also the school year begins. More than that, it is the Jewish New Year.

Rosh Hashanah (the anniversary of the creation of Adam

and Eve, a Day of Judgment and coronation of G-d as king) is a day of opportunity for closeness to the Divine. Some find it through introspection, others through meditation. For some, prayer is the medium of choice, while for others it is the shofar blasts that pierce through the curtains of the mundane.

#### Share-The-Plate Fall 2014 Update

First UU has been undergoing a lot of change in the last year. We are continuing our conversations with our faith neighbors in Montclair as we draw closer in our dealings. This include the possibility of stream their services to our church and the hiring of a new part-time minister who will be working in close cooperation with the Montclair ministerial team. However, we had to continue our effort this past semester of holding only two formal services a month. This impacted on our Sunday collections and therefore on Share-The-Plate. Total Sunday collections so far for 2013/14 it was \$ 2045.00 while for 2012/13 it was \$ 2526.50. For the coming church year, we expect about 35 formal services. So, to meet if not exceed last year's total.

The recipient for the Winter/Spring 2014 was ORNG INK, a community arts program by & for youth, run under the auspices of HANDS, Inc., Valley Arts & the University of Orange. The period ran from 26 January to 1 June 2014 and raised a total of \$688.

In total as of 1 July 2014, Share-The-Plate has collected and distributed \$7319.50 since its inception. This is all due to our church's giving spirit. Thank you very much.

#### Fall 2014 "SHARE-THE-PLATE" RECIPIENT CHOSEN

At it's 4 May 2014 meeting, First UU's Social Action Committee chose the next recipient for our "Share-The-Plate" program. There was one submission for the Montclair Emergency Services for the Homeless (MESH). MESH is a local, faith-based organization dedicated to engaging the Montclair community to provide basic and essential services to Montclair's most vulnerable homeless adults. The UU Congregation at Montclair (UUCM) is one of at least six houses of worship in the Montclair area that participate in the MESH program. For the last four years, every Wednesday evening from September thru June they serve between 45-60 people a fivecourse, home cooked meal. Approximately 20 volunteers shop for, cook, serve and clean up after these meals weekly. When the weather is extremely harsh, guests in need are also afforded an overnight respite. The program is completely self-funded, relying on donations from participating volunteers and other concerned members of our community. MESH and UUCM are both 501(c)3 non-profit organizations. Donations will be made out to UUCM and tagged "MESH" in order to use the funds to support their Wednesday night meal ministry.

The committee endorsed this proposal and it was confirmed by the Board of Trustees at its 21 May 2014 meeting with the proviso that the First UU of Essex will be credited as an independent sponsor.

The collection period will run from 14 September 2014 through 25 January 2015. Share-The-Plate requires that at least half of the cumulative unrestricted donations made during the Offertory of any formal Sunday service will be set aside for a designated charity. Checks made to the church as part of members' pledge fulfillment, or for any other previously announced appeal (such as Chalice Lighters), will not be included.

The goals of Share-The-Plate is to promote the congregation's stated vision "to be a life affirming liberal religious community where people of diverse beliefs, ideas and backgrounds come together to provide spiritual and intellectual growth to one another and to work together in Orange, New Jersey for a greater good in the world", and to fulfill the congregation's mission "to study and practice religion in freedom and fellowship", and "[t]o provide support and care for our [religious]

community and the community at large". It will also be seen as a way to enhance the meaning of the church's relationships with and among partners in the larger local community, build awareness, learn more about ourselves and the projects the church gives to, and to develop a philosophy of giving within the church community. However, the program is not intended to not displace other regular and special funding appeals.

Members can submit potential candidate organizations and programs to the Social Action Committee, either directly, by mail or through the church web site (<u>http://essexuu.org/share\_the\_plate.html</u>). The committee will review submissions to see if they fit with the church's mission, vision and the program's goals, before sending their choice to the Board of Trustees. All charities must be submitted by a church member, be either a 501(c) 3 or 501(c) 4 non-profit organization, do work that is consistent with Unitarian Universalist principles, supply a name and description of the charitable organization or project, and supply contact information.

Separate checks for the charity, either given during the Offertory or sent to the church for this purpose, should either be made out to the charity or to "The First Unitarian Universalist Church of Essex County" with "Share the Plate" in the "memo" line. To the extent allowed by law, checks written to the church will be acknowledged as a tax deductible donation. A church check for at least 50% of all unrestricted donations given during Sunday collections, as well as any received checks to be forwarded, with be sent with an acknowledgement letter no later than ten days after the last collection for that charity.
