Editorial: A Community Asset by Charlie Wirene, HUUB Managing Director

Since its founding in November 2015, The HUUB has been committed to bringing the Unitarian Universalist principles to life through an asset-based ethos, which has been successful and rewarding. While we believed in the importance of our idea and its potential when we started, we could not have predicted The HUUB's true need in the community and the embrace we've received since opening our doors.

Our first HUUB Listening Fellows, Holly Barszcz, Khemani Gibson, and Patricia Rogers, developed three amazing projects that are actively building and strengthening our relationships with these communities: the Spring *Solidarity Potluck Series*; *Immigrant Dreams*; and *Amplifying Youth Voices*. Through these projects we are connecting to many different groups in Orange, from youth to elders, longtime city residents to newly arrived ones, educators to faith leaders, and everywhere in between.

The HUUB has become an active and familiar resource for people in Orange: we have organized events ourselves (including the *100-Year-Old House* conference and the Fellows' projects, co-hosted events and initiatives with partners (including the Foreclosure Forum and *Just & Safe Orange* series), and provided space for people from the city to hold their own events as well (including the Committee for an Elected Board of Education, and a funeral repast for Jordan Bryan, the young man killed in gun violence in April 2016). We have met our goals, our familiarity with city residents has deepened, and through these new relationships we have found new opportunities to provide support to the community.

It was from this position we were given an exciting opportunity to administer a micro-grant project and expand our asset-based work by providing financial resources to support project ideas in the city. The goal of the Neighborhood Project Grants initiative is to support resident-led initiatives in the Heart of Orange neighborhood that build community, cultivate neighborhood leadership, expand youth activities, promote wellness and health and celebrate the city's diversity. We are working on the micro-grants with HANDS, Orange's local community development corporation.

Through the end of 2018 the Neighborhood Project Grants initiative will open five grant rounds. During the first, from June to September 2017, we received 21 project proposals and awarded 14 Neighborhood Project Grants. The summer's round of applications were heavily focused on cultural identity, community safety, and school based initiatives: the Italian American and Latin American street fairs, back to school backpack giveaways at Rosa Parks

and Oakwood Avenue Schools, a community barbeque, and youth leadership and mentoring through art projects (murals and photovoice), club sports (basketball and football), and service groups (Orange High School's Navy Junior ROTC). We'll be uploading interviews and photos to our Facebook pages, so check them out! This fall and winter at The HUUB we will continue our Community Listening Project while offering some new programming as well. On Monday, 16 October, we are starting our monthly *Solidarity Potlucks* again, with Music City performances and an Asset-Based Com-

munity Development (ABCD) refresher. On 27 October, *Don't Drop The Mic* will be back, a showcase of local musical talent we've hosted a few times already.

We are working with the University of Orange on two other important and exciting projects. The first is a Collective Recovery curriculum responding to the violence the community has experienced over the last two years. The second is a long-distance learning collaboration with folks from Niagara Falls to develop a series of Resident Leader Trainings on community organizing and critical urbanism.

People are also interested in hearing about what we're doing! I'll be visiting a handful of UU congregations over the next month to talk about our Urban Ministry and what we've learned over the last year. On Sunday, 15 October, I will be speaking at The Unitarian Society in East Brunswick. On Saturday, 21 October, Greg Giacobbe and I will be in Albany NY, leading a workshop at the New York State Convention of Universalists' annual meeting.

Our asset-based ethos is bringing the UU principles to life in new and exciting ways: supporting the skills and worth that every person has; building community focused on peace, liberty, and justice; finding our direction through compassion and empathy; setting justice and equity as goals in everything we do. On 6 June 1976, school students in Soweto refused to participate in a system that was educating them to be oppressed. This uprising set in motion the forces that would eventually topple the Apartheid system. That year, our presenter, Robert Sember, was 13 years old - the same age as many of the students who led the struggle. What he witnessed that year taught him that while we might not have chosen the histories into which we are born, we can be protagonists of the future. Robert will discuss what he has learned from his experiences in South Africa and the US about what it means to be a protagonist of hope.

Robert Sember is Assistant Professor of Interdisciplinary Arts at The New School's Eugene Lang College and a Senior Associate at the Center for Social Innovation where he focuses on how changes to the U.S. health care system affect the lives of people with mental health and addiction needs. Born in 1963 in South Africa and raised under Apartheid system, he was active in the war resistance and gay rights movements. After arriving in
