Editorial: Faith & Works - Building Solidarity By Dr. Mindy Fullilove, Church President

Dear Members and Friends of First UU:

This has been a year of moving forward with our great project, to turn our congregation outward to the City of Orange. We have hosted music, dance, festivals, and religious services of many kinds. Our own FAITH+WORKS services have been grounding and inspiring. Celebrating Passover and looking forward to our Iftar, planting our grounds to celebrate flower communion – so much has gone on that I've appreciated. For example, in the middle of the ecological crisis, I've appreciated that we've decided to use our dishes. Washing and drying dishes together has been a small but important step.

Every year, as members and friends, we give money to make sure that the work of our congregation can go forward. We do this in two parts that represent our FAITH and our WORKS, remembering that faith without works is dead, and as we like to say, works without faith is dead. As UUs we don't do formal "tithing," rather we think it is a matter for personal reflection, in light of your own circumstances. You are already giving in the matter of showing up, washing dishes, and living the seven principles in your life. What additional monetary contribution might you be

able to make? Here's what we need to raise, in two parts.

The FAITH part is the support of the church itself, which is most particularly our job. In consultation with the HUUB, we created two separate budgets. The church budget, which supports Greg, pays our dues to the UU Association, covers costs of worship, and other clearly "church" costs, is set at \$12,000 this year. After tallying the church's various income sources, we are left with \$2,865 to raise in this budget to cover church expenses. There are currently 37 members, families, and friends in our member directory, which comes out to about \$80 each to cover our church budget for this year. **You can make this contribution by check to the church or as part of your contribution to the HUUB on the ioby platform -- just let Charlie Wirene know which part is for the church.**



The WORKS part is to support the work of the HUUB, and in this, we ask a much larger community to join us. We are

In these challenging times we turn to wise people who can articulate FAITH and describe how their faith supports their WORKS. The service title — Active Hope — is taken from the 2012 book by Joanna Macy and Chris Johnstone. The complete title of the book is Active Hope: How to Face the Mess We're In Without Going Crazy and you are highly encouraged to add this to your summer reading list! As the authors state in their introduction "We can no longer take it for granted that the resources we're dependent on — food, fuel, and drinkable water — will be available. We can no longer take it for granted even that our civilization will survive or that conditions on our planet will remain hospitable for complex forms of life." The book tackles the question of how does one not feel completely overwhelmed by that reality? This service will explore how the understanding three narratives (Business As Usual, The Great Unraveling, and The Great Awakening) might help answer that question in a way that can resonate here in this community at this time.

Charles Loflin was born and raised in Yazoo City, MS. Although his family was religiously unaffiliated, he attended a Southern Baptist church and was very active through high school. Feeling a call to ministry, he attended Mississippi College (a Southern Baptist affiliated school) and earned a degree in Religion and a minor in Communications/Theatre Studies. Charles served as a minister for a small congregation in rural Mississippi, and had planned to attend seminary after college but found himself increasingly uncomfortable with the theological and political leanings of evangelical Christianity. He embarked instead on a career in the arts and earned a MFA in Acting from the University of Louisville, Kentucky. He moved to New York City where he split his time working as an actor/director/producer and paying the bills by working in the field of technology as a programmer and developer. He and his family moved to New Jersey in 2001. Charles "discovered" Unitarian Universalism sometime around 2008 and found the religious home that spoke to his values, politics, and theology and has been an active member of the Unitarian Universalist Congregation of Montclair. In 2018, feeling a persistent sense of call, Charles began pursuing a Master of Divinity degree from Meadville Lombard Theological School in Chicago. As part of his first year Community Studies, Charles served as intern here at the HUUB @ First UU Essex. This summer he will be fulfilling his CPE requirement at Robert Wood Johnson Hospital in New Brunswick and will begin a two-year congregational internship at the Morristown Unitarian Universalist Fellowship in the fall. He's on track to graduate in May of 2021. He lives in Montclair with his amazing wife and together they have three children — Connor, Morgan, and Lauren — too many cats and an English bulldog named Rose.

Here's why I think this is important. We find ourselves in a dire moment of climate change, tyranny, mass extinction and international war, on the global scale, and poverty, housing shortages, and stagnant wages at home. We do know we have no time to waste if we want to make a better future for all. My father, Ernest Thompson, was a union and community organizer who wrote about his experiences in *Homeboy Came to Orange: A Story of People's Power*. He closed his book on this note of urgency saying:

United States is at the crossroads. And time has run out. It has run out on us morally in the eyes of humankind and in the eyes of God. We have no more time for war, or exploitation, or poisoning the earth. We must learn to live together now. The problem in the United States of people living together is a Black-white problem. The separatists – be they Black or white – only obstruct our way. They have no answers for the tasks confronting us. These tasks are too crucial to be entrusted to the warmongers and the profiteers. The money-changers must once again be driven from the temple so that the people can prevail, for only the people can be entrusted with their own future.

I believe that we can—and will—face this crisis by building community built on our principles, from washing dishes together to showing up in the struggle for equality and justice for all living beings. Our strong church will be the cornerstone of our work – let's support it in all the ways we can.



The Rev. Frederick-Gray is the ninth president of the UUA. She was elected in June 2017 to a six-year term. She acts as principal spokesperson and minister-at-large for the UUA. Susan brings a strong focus on mission and strategic planning to her leadership at the UUA as it works to dismantle systems of white supremacy.

As president, Susan has emphasized that this is no time for a casual faith and no time to go it alone. She represented the UUA in the 2017 Charlottesville protests against white nationalist violence, worked in conjunction with the Poor Peoples Campaign on issues of poverty, witnessed at the US-Mexico border for immigrant justice, and partnered with local advocates to expand voting rights in Florida.
