From Darrell's Desk

The Seven-Day Ministry

Several weeks ago I met with UU Metro District Executive, Andrea Lerner, and Rev. Tracy Sprowls-Jenks of the Plainfield UU congregation—which shares our goals of urban ministry. The "take away" from the meeting for me was that ministry has become, and will be more so in the future. not centered on Sunday morning worship, or, at least, it will be much less centered there than in the past.

In a way, this is not news. UU's were talking like this thirty years ago, when I was just starting out as a minister. Small group ministry, affinity groups, interest groups, prayer or meditation circles, were just some of the names for how we were supposed to move ministry from making Sunday morning carry so much congregational weight.

This did help large churches become larger. However, it has been my

experience that for churches fewer than 150 with members, Sunday worship has remained, for better or worse, the center and primary mechanism of community cohesion and ministry.

What I began to consider after our meeting, was that while small churches have continued with Sunday-centered ministry, the world has moved on. Social media, fragmented work schedules, and lowered commitments to one's immediate community have all contributed.

Our congregation does in fact spread its ministry beyond Sunday in many meaningful wavs: from sharing our facilities to involvement in revitalization of the Orange Valley, for example. But we know each other through Sunday worship. We have an expectation that new members will attend worship regularly.

What I learned in speaking with Andrea and Tracy is that we probably need to change that model. To what? I'm not at all sure. That's why beginning now, we need to begin talking together about what this means and what strategies we might create to minister to this future. Let me know you thoughts on this topic.

Richard Reno Neff in memoriam

Richard Reno Neff ("Rick" to his family and many friends) passed away on March 17, 2012, at the age of 74. Rick was a folk musician, businessman, Unitarian-Universalist minister and reference librarian. In recent years,

he was the author and publisher of "Rick's Journal," an enewsletter for family and friends on politics, philosophy, art, and economics. He was born in the Bronx, NY, on June 11, 1937, to Mary Himoff and Earl Reno, and lived there until he was nine. His mother later married Walter S. Neff, who adopted him. The family moved to Chicago in 1947, where Rick attended the Dewey Lab School of the University of Chicago. Rick entered the University as a freshman at the age of 16, but left when he was 18, to travel, work odd jobs, and write and perform folk music. During this time, Rick wrote, among other songs, a version of "John Riley," a traditional song that was recorded by The Byrds on their "Fifth Dimension" album.

During his 20s, Rick worked at the Monroe Company in Chicago. In the 1960s, he was active in the civil rights movement, joining in the Selma-Montgomery march with Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. In 1966, after two early marriages ended in divorce, he



married Joan Mahoney. They moved to Berkeley, Calif., where Rick attended Thomas Starr King Seminary and became a Unitarian- Universalist minister. While in Berkeley, Rick and Joan had a son, Joshua Michael, in 1969. In 1971, they had a second son, Jeremy Daniel, after moving to Farmington, Mich., where Rick took his first post as a minister. Rick and Joan divorced in 1975. In 1976, Rick married Kathryn Price, and they relocated to Flushing, NY, where Rick became minister of a Unitarian- Universalist church. In 1979, they moved to Joliet, Ill., where Rick assumed the ministership of another Unitarian- Universalist congregation. In 1986, Rick and Kathryn moved to West Orange, NJ, where Rick assumed the ministership of another church. While in New Jersey, his marriage to Kathryn ended. In 1993, Rick retired from the ministry.

At the age of 56, decided to begin a new career: he attended library school at Rutgers University, where he earned his MLS in 1997. He subsequently worked in and managed libraries in Livingston, Butler and Linden, NJ. Rick loved working as a librarian, but health problems forced him to retire in 2002. After that, he lived in Lake Wylie, South Carolina, from 2003-2008. He moved to Overland Park, Kan., in 2008, where he lived until his death. He is survived by a brother, Alan Neff, in Chicago; two cousins, Susan Burns and William Forbes of Kathmandu, Nepal; his sons, Joshua and Jeremy; three grandchildren, Morgan Rowena Neff, August Levi Neff, and Hazel May Neff; and numerous friends and former congregants around the country, who will miss him and his distinctive Journal.
