Beloved Community Sunday is a time when people of all backgrounds who are interested in the future of the City of Orange, NJ can gather to get to know each other, and work together. This Sunday, we will talk about the Death with Dignity Act, which is currently moving through the New Jersey Legislature. This informational presentation, along with a clip from the documentary "How to Die in Oregon" will be followed by a Q&A for the interest and education for members & friends.

Ethan Andersen is a field organizer for Compassion & Choices, a national organization promoting end-of-life choices for the terminally ill. Majoring in Finance at Rutgers University. he spent a year volunteering at St. Peter's University Hospital in New Brunswick, which brought him into contact with terminally ill adults, and their struggle with end of life issues. After working on a political campaign, Ethan started volunteering with Compassion & Choices and became very involved in the process for passing the Death with Dignity Act in New Jersey. Now a Field Organizer, his my goal to educate and inform the public of this legislation, which he believes would provide terminally ill adults with the choice they deserve.
