### Spiritually Speaking: Amazing Grace By Rev. Gordon Clay Bailey

"Amazing grace, how sweet the sound." John Newton, the eighteenth-century Englishman who wrote the famous hymn, had been a slave trader before he became a prominent abolitionist. He said his change of heart, which turned his life around, was amazing grace! It changed him, transformed his actions, and "it saved a wretch like me."

Grace is usually thought of as an undeserved gift: an unexpected reprieve, unmerited divine assistance given to humans for their regeneration or sanctification, a virtue coming from God, approval, favor (stayed in His/Her good graces),

mercy, pardon, a special favor, privilege bestowed that is not necessarily earned. It's the buoy that appears from nowhere and saves our lives. So, what problems do we modern folks need to be rescued from? What is wretched about our situations? Here are a few: physical and emotional suffering, loss of meaning, existential despair. The issues are too numerous to count!

Given our contemporary need for rescue - and I'm speaking specifically of our need to make a decision about the future of this historic congregation - the ideology of liberal theologian Henry Nelson Wieman (1884-1975) is most appropriate. Wieman's theology came to depend little on the divine, but he kept room for grace.

In The Source of Human Good (1946), Wieman struggles with the fact that we humans plunge into despair when we fail to live up to our ideals. According to Wieman, however, a creative power or process (call it God, the Divine, etc.) can transform us into beings capable of doing good. How about the good we could do

as a hands-on UU justice seeking people in Essex County?

This process, which he called "creative interchange," is at work whenever individuals or congregations communicate in ways that create new meanings. As we process these new meanings (our new vi-

pands and our sense of belonging is made stronger. That, for Wieman, is grace. And, for me, it is the reality I am choosing to live my life in. How about you?

So as we approach the end of yet another fast moving year, I call on each of us to consider the grace that operates in our lives. How many times this past year did something good happen when you thought nothing could come of the situation? Or what about the job, school, or relationship that was going badly that turned around? Maybe, it was more personal, as my case. Maybe your health has challenged and you had to go through a difficult time. I know we each don't get the reprieve. I know each of you have


# Celebrate the Guest at Your Table!


