
**2 Apr TBD Khemani Gibson Leader - Mindy Thompson Fullilove, Musician- TBD**

Khemani Gibson was born in Kingston, Jamaica before his parents migrated and settled in Orange, NJ in the early 1990s. Growing up, Khemani always loved storytelling and history ranging from the Anansi stories his mother told him and his siblings to learning about notable black figures such as Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., Billie Holiday, Jackie Robinson and others during black history month which he looked forward towards every school year. In high school, Khemani participated in the murmur oral history project where he interviewed orange residents and learned about the rich history that existed in his hometown. Prior to the project, Khemani viewed Orange negatively and couldn't wait to go to college and leave. However, the project taught Khemani the beauty of uncovering lost histories about people and place taken for granted. For this reason Khemani studied history at Drew University where he began to apply the lessons he learned from murmur and his love for good storytelling to uncover the history of his own family's migratory history in Panama during the construction of the Panama Canal. He also served a consultant on the hidden treasures project working with students from the Humanities core at the scholars Academy as they also learned about the richness of Orange's history. Currently khemani is a history PhD Candidate at New York University where he studies the lives and communities of black immigrants in twentieth century Panama as well as a community organizer in Orange that seeks to increase youth civic and social participation in his hometown.

### Editorial [cont.]

On 8 February, a long disused and nearly forgotten piece of First UU's history was given a makeover, thanks to HUUB Managing Director Charlie Wirene. The chair, near right, was the possession and usual place to find our past minister, Rev. Dr. Phillips Endecott Osgood (far right), who served our church from 1949 until his death in 1956. The chair (as well as the vestry in the rear of the Sanctuary) were dedicated in his honor. Born on 11 May 1882 and raised in the historic town of North Attleboro MA, Dr Osgood was the son of an Episcopal clergyman. He continued his father's legacy, becoming an ordained Episcopal priest in 1908 and serving congregations in Massachusetts, Philadelphia and Minneapolis. A change in his theological outlook prompted his resignation from his last charge as Rector of Emmanuel Church in Boston in the spring of 1945. A prolific writer and accomplished painter, he had about a dozen titles published, most concerning liturgical drama, as well as many articles in denominational and popular periodicals. His ordination as a Unitarian minister occurred simultaneously with his start at First UU, then the First Unitarian Church of Essex County. We thank Ayman Upholstery of west Orange for their fine work.

Douglas Farrand is a composer, musician, educator, and learner. Having lived in and around Nottinghamshire (UK), Cork (Ireland), Singapore, Ohio and Upstate New York (US), he currently resides in Newark NJ and works in Orange NJ. He directs and teaches with Sonic Explorations, a K-4 daily, free music program at the Oakwood Avenue Community School, and works with the music department of the University of Orange, a free people's urbanism school. Douglas' primary interests are in music and teaching that invite us to explore our myriad processes of listening and embody a collective investigation of place, community, and personhood. His work has been realized in the USA, Canada, Belgium and Switzerland, and includes close collaborative work with fellow composers, performers, artists, educators, & students. Douglas studied composition privately with Craig Shepard and at Oberlin Conservatory with Josh Levine and Ashley Fure. He has received additional mentorship in composition, improvisation, musicianship, and education from Christopher Fox, Tim Feeney, and Vic Rawlings.

**Christopher Lynn "Chris" Hedges** is an American journalist, activist, author, and Presbyterian minister. He has written 11 books, including the New York Times best seller “Days of Destruction, Days of Revolt” (2012), which he co-authored with the cartoonist Joe Sacco.

Hedges previously spent nearly two decades as a foreign correspondent in Central America, the Middle East, Africa and the Balkans. He has reported from more than 50 countries and has worked for The Christian Science Monitor, National Public Radio, The Dallas Morning News and The New York Times, for which he was a foreign correspondent for 15 years.

Hedges is a senior fellow at The Nation Institute in New York City. He has taught at Columbia University, New York University, Princeton University and The University of Toronto. He currently teaches prisoners at a maximum-security prison in New Jersey.

Hedges holds a B.A. in English literature from Colgate University and a Master of Divinity degree from Harvard University. In addition to writing a weekly original column for Truthdig, he has written for Harper’s Magazine, Le Monde, The New Statesman, The New York Review of Books, Adbusters, Granta, Foreign Affairs and other publications. In 2014, Chris Hedges was ordained as a minister at the Second Presbyterian Church. He lives in Princeton.


## Across Time, Across Generations
