## Editorial: The Three R's by Gregory Giacobe

This Spring was definitely a time of renewal, rejuvenation and resistance at First UU. With the mild winter turning to a cold, lingering spring, we played host to a number of gatherings. In February and March, the church was the site of two town hall meetings on the foreclosure crisis in New Jersey. Led by Orange City Council President Donna K Williams, the town halls both elucidated the grave situation for many homeowners, as well as giving them a chance to express their frustrations. In addition, the University of Orange, a free people's university, began using our spaces in earnest as they held a multi-session musical theory course, their Urban Alchemy Workshop, Amplifying Youth Voices, and Unearthing Hidden Treasures - part of their ongoing Placemaking series. In May, the U of O, along with the HUUB and the Rosa Parks Community School, presented the Music City Festival. Along side these happenings, U of O and the HUUB continued their series of Building Solidarity potlucks with increasing turnout and engaging speakers.

First UU and the HUUB proved valuable allies for our tenants, Wind of the Spirit, the Laundry Workers Center and Lanbi as we built resistance to the anti-immigrant policies emanating from the current administration in Washington. We heard our neighbors cries for justice, and responded by providing not only space but our time and organizing abilities to help make Orange a "sanctuary" city. As a result, our coalition was able to pass a strong resolution in the Orange City Council declaring Orange a Fair and Welcoming community. Next on the agenda is to pass an ordinance and police directive for the Orange

Police not to cooperate with Immigration and Customs Enforcement. We are continuing to work with our allies, as well with the UU Legislative Ministry, to spread the sanctuary movement to the county and state levels.

The theme continued as First UU held its second annual innovative Flower Communion on 21 May. On a mild, partly sunny afternoon, about 15 Members and Friends came together to share in the spirit of former Member Rev. Norbert Capek as we weeded and planted new



flowers in the church's redesigned front entrance way. After a brief break, a small but determined group of Members got down to business for the church's Annual Meeting. Reports were presented, a budget for the 2017/18 church year was examined and approved, as well as a new resolution to suspend term limits for all elective positions. This was done due to a lack of available candidates. In addition, a call was sent out to all Members and Friends for volunteers to serve on the Board, the

Nominating Committee, to handle Social Action activities, including tending the church/community garden, and to augment the Worship & Music team. Those interested should contact the church office.

With summer almost upon us, First UU/the HUUB will take a break to rest, take stock and prepare for the new church year in the fall. We will continue with FAITH+WORKS in our worship program, as well as our work with tenants and other groups on issues effecting our community and neighbors. We here at First UU/the HUUB wish you and yours a happy and healthy season, and invite you back for our first service on Sunday, 17 September 2017 at 5 PM. See you at church!



He has received additional mentorship in composition, improvisation, musicianship, and education from Christopher Fox, Tim Feeney, and Vic Rawlings.

Letter From The President

Dear Congregants and Friends:

Though this has been a shocking year in national politics, First Unitarian Universalist Church of Essex County has been counted “present” in the growing resistance. The Sunday after the November election, we help organize a potluck at which 35 people shared their anguish and searched for the way forward. Through our new “Faith+Works” series, we have supported people’s spirits in this difficult time. Through our HUUB, we have offered our space for organizing sanctuary city events, solidarity potlucks, Teach-Ins, and more. When a general call went out to UU congregations to have teaching about white supremacy, we could respond that that had been a part of our organizing since January.

We can also be proud that we have taken care of our campus. A leak in the roof got patched, the boiler got replaced, and our building has been proposed for the National Register of Historic Places. Our buildings have welcomed many, many people to worship, organize and play.

Therefore, we [are] both sobered by the national situation and determined to be part of turning away from hate and repression, and [work toward] building a democratic society based on love and acceptance. There is more love somewhere!

On Sunday, May 21st, we plant[ed] flowers for Flower Communion, and then tour[ed] our buildings, to appreciate our new boiler and other improvements that are keeping our buildings ready for service. At our annual meeting, we hear [d] reports about the HUUB and about our Faith+Works worship series. We [passed] important issues of reorganization and our budget for the upcoming year. We reaffirm[ed] our commitment, as people of faith, to be part of the struggles that lie ahead.

I look forward to seeing you [in the next church year].

### In Memoriam: Rev. Cynthia J Ward

We want to acknowledge the passing of former minister, Rev. Cynthia Johnson Ward, who died on 9 May 2017 at Brooks Howell Home in Asheville NC at the age of 88. Born in Auburndale MA on 11 August 1928 to Charles and Alice Libby Johnson, Cynthia faced the death of her mother when she was only 5. She was then raised by her father and step-mother, Lucille Burnham Johnson. The oldest of five (four girls and a boy), Cynthia graduated from Newton (MA) High School and attended Rutgers University - Douglass College in New Brunswick NJ, where she graduated with a BA in English in 1950. Cynthia worked as a journalist and editor. She later taught high school English, and earned a Master of Arts in Teaching from Trenton State College (now the College of New Jersey) in 1975.

While working as a waitress at The Warren House hotel in Spring Lake NJ, she met and later married (in 1950) Jack Leo Ward of Elizabeth NJ, beginning a relationship that would last over 50 years. Jack and Cynthia bore five children: Mark, Keith, Terry, Lisa and Scott. They settled in Princeton and then Pennington NJ. While Jack went on to develop a private psychiatric practice in Trenton NJ, Cynthia was a homemaker.

Born and raised a Congregationalist, Cynthia, along with Jack, transitioned toward Unitarian Universalism, with Cynthia served as a religious educator at various congregations throughout the 60s and 70s. In 1975 she became the RE Coordinator at the Unitarian Church of Princeton (now the UU Congregation of Princeton) NJ, a position she held for seven years. After a time, however, Cynthia began to pursue her call toward ministry in earnest. She carried out her ministerial internship at the First UU Church of Essex County in Orange NJ from 1983 to 1984, received a Master of Divinity from New Brunswick Theological Seminary in 1984, and was ordained on 17 November 1985 by the Princeton congregation.

She served the First UU Church of Essex County as interim minis-

ter from 1994 to 1996 as well as UU congregations in Hastings-on-Hudson, and Brooklyn Heights, NY. In addition, she was a frequent consultant for UU churches in religious education and congregational dynamics. She was also a mentor for women entering professional ministry and religion education at a time when many women found it hard making their way into that work and being taken seriously. Cynthia retired from the ministry in 2000, but remained active in her congregations, most recently at the UU Congregation of Asheville NC.



In reflecting on her denomination and ministry, Cynthia remarked, "I believe the challenge of being a Unitarian Universalist is the challenge of discovering just what it is you do believe and how that belief... can be alive in your life. As a minister I believe in the challenge of creating a community of faith, hope, justice and love... As a minister I believe in enabling persons to that challenge, that grows and changes in the life of the community and in the lives of the persons involved with that community. We come together today to make our visions into tomorrow's reality."

She is survived by two sisters, a brother, five sons and a daughter, seven grandchildren and two great grandchildren. A memorial service to celebrate her life will be held on Saturday, 22 July 2017 at 3 PM, in the chapel at Brooks Howell Nursing Home, 266 Merrimon Ave. in Asheville.

Her family is grateful for the excellent care that Cynthia received in her years at Brooks Howell and from the staff of Carepartners Hospice.
